**We serve** South Central and Southwestern Wisconsin including Dane, Columbia, Sauk, Richland, Crawford, Rock, Green, Iowa, Lafayette and Grant counties. Our services include:

**Family Support Group Meetings:** These meetings are open to individuals, parents, family members and friends dealing in some way with an Autism Spectrum Disorder. All of our meetings are free and open to the public. Sorry, there is **no childcare** provided during our meetings. We hold Support Group meetings on the third Tuesday of every other month (January, March, May, July, September, November) and workshops.

**Free Workshops:** on the third Tuesday of alternate months (Feb., April, June, Aug., Oct.), we offer free workshops that are open to the public. We also offer Autism

101 classes for parents of newly diagnosed children with an Autism Spectrum Disorder.

## Awareness Campaign with Fox 47

ASGM is excited to announce our partnership with Fox 47 and the Waisman Center. Chris Lezotte from Fox 47 proposed an educational campaign to increase awareness of early detection and intervention of autism in late October 2008. The hope is that parents will become more aware of what developmental signs to look for. If they should suspect a delay, they are encouraged to reach out to their physicians for help. ### Peer Support in Schools Workshop

Much thanks goes to Dr. Erik Carter who presented at the Annual Meeting on Tue., April 21, 2009.

Dr. Erik Carter, Assist. Prof., Dept. of Rehab. Psych. & Sp. Ed. presented his latest research, "Promoting Social Relationships, Learning and Inclusion through Peer Support Strategies." The results of some research about the important roles peers can play in supporting meaningful social and academic participation in inclusive classrooms and extracurricular activities were thought provoking.

Schools often rely on individually assigned paraprofessionals or special educators to support school participation. Yet, these one-to-one support approaches often inadvertently hinder meaningful inclusion. Dr. Carter will share research support for peer support strategies as an alternative to individually assigned adult support and practical resources for implementing these interventions in school settings.

There is a new partnership between Star Cinema, Imagine a Child's Capacity (ICC) and the Autism Society of Greater Madison. Star Cinema and ICC have been running these sensory friendly films for the past three years. A movie experience designed to be enjoyed by all! Featuring lower movie volume; Higher theatre lights; "Break area" available; Accepting and Inviting atmosphere. Please enter through the IMAX entrance on the EAST side of Star Cinema.

Many thanks are due to Sharon Hammer at ICC and Steve Carpenter from Star Cinema for providing our community an opportunity to view films on the "big screen" in an environment sensitive to families with special needs.

The cost is \$5 per person. These events are not fundraisers for ICC or ASGM. All proceeds go to Star Cinema for the use of their facilities. ICC and ASGM provide volunteers to check attendees at the IMAX entrance on the east side of Star Cinema. We also provide a "quiet area" with a large crash pillow and tent. Fidgets and other sensory objects have been loaned out by ICC, however, an effort to ascertain a supply of these items just for the use of this event is being made.

These films are shown on the last Saturday of every month, without fail! Doors open at 9:00am. And the show starts at 9:30 am. Only twice has a film been shown more than once due to popularity of the film and/or the unavailability of a family-friendly film rating for that particular month.

"Organizing Strategies to Help Students Carry Out Homework Assignments to Prepare Them for the Real World: An Interdisciplinary Treatment Approach"

**Michelle Garcia Winner** is an SLP who specializes in students with social cognitive deficits. She runs a clinic; authored numerous books and speaks internationally. Michelle's goal is to help educators and parents appreciate how social thinking and social skills is an integral part of students academic, vocational and community success. She was honored with a "Congressional Special Recognition Award" in 2008.

8:30 – 10:30 AM Keynote Speaker: SCOTT BELLINI, PhD

"The Delivery of Effective Social Skills Programming to Individuals on the Autism Spectrum: Notes and Observations from the Classroom, Clinic, Laboratory...and Dinner Table"

**Scott Bellini, PhD** is the Assistant Director of the Indiana Resource Center for Autism (IRCA) and an Assistant Professor of School Psychology at Indiana University, Bloomington. He is also the Director of the newly formed Social Skills Research Center (SSRC), a university based center specializing in developing and empirically examining the outcomes of social skill interventions for youth with ASD. He is a licensed psychologist in the state of Indiana and an endorsed Health Services Provider in Psychology.

He is currently conducting research on professional development outcomes for educators, anxiety disorders, and social skill interventions, including video modeling for youth with ASD. He has published numerous research manuscripts and has provided consultation and training to families and professionals in over 25 states on the topic of social skills programming for students with ASD. He is the author of the book, *Building Social Relationships*, which was named the 2007 Literary Work of the Year by the Autism Society of America.

8:30 – 10:30 AM Keynote Speaker: MORTON ANN GERNSBACHER, PhD

#### "Autism: Reducing the Stigma"

Stigma has been defined as "any quality or trait that marks its bearer as inferior."

Once a group of people have been stigmatized, other persons construct ideologies to explain and magnify the stigmatized persons' inferiority. There can be little doubt that persons with the disability of autism have been stigmatized. This presentation will explore how the stigma of autism arose and how the stigma can – and should – be reduced. In particular, examples will be drawn from other disabilities, such as epilepsy, which have been successfully reduced in stigma, and concrete steps will be suggested that parents, professionals, and society members can take to reduce the stigma of autism.

**Morton Gernsbacher, PhD** received her Ph.D. from the University of Texas at Austin in 1983, and was an assistant, associate, and full professor at the University of Oregon, from 1983 to 1992, when she then joined the faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where she is a Vilas Research Professor and the Sir Frederic C. Bartlett Professor of Psychology. She is a fellow of the Society for Experimental Psychologists, the American Psychological Association (Divisions 1, 3, and 6), the American Psychological Society, the American Educational Research Association, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. She has received a Research Career Development (K) Award and a Senior Research Fellowship from the National Institutes of Health, a Fulbright Research Scholar Award, a James McKeen Cattell Foundation Fellowship, and a Professional Opportunities for Women Award from the National Science Foundation.
